Changing a Tire

Getting a flat tire is never a fun experience, but if you have the right tools and a little bit of knowledge, it doesn't have to ruin your day.

Read on to learn how. our middle schoolers learned this important life skill.







Your first step is to find your spare tire, car jack, and tire iron. Most cars will have this in the trunk under a panel. Some larger cars might have a full size tire mounted on the outside. Occasionally, a car will not have a spare tire, in which case you will need to call a tow truck.

Next, you will need to use your tire iron to loosen the lug nuts. You may need to use your whole body weight. Don't take them all the way off yet! Then, find the jack point nearest to your flat tire. Place the car jack underneath it, insert the crank mechanism, and crank until the car is raised off the ground enough to remove the tire.

Remove the lug nuts completely. Then, put the spare tire on the bolts. Screw in the lug nuts, and tighten them in a star pattern to ensure an even torque. Lower the jack completely. Give the lug nuts another round of starpattern tightening, this time using your body weight to get them really tight.
